  - Senate Dems introduced CCCERA on June 30
  - Senate GOP Introduced Companion Bills July 28

#### **Congress is Acting Now on Final COVID Relief Bill**

Dear Colleague:

We are at an urgent inflection point in Washington as Congress begins to negotiate House and Senate and Democratic and Republican proposals to provide federal relief as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Negotiators are aiming to pass a final bill in the next ten days. I am writing to ask you to call your Representative and Senators again in support of our collective priorities for private, nonprofit higher education in the next federal relief bill.

With Senate Republicans unveiling their <u>coronavirus relief proposals</u> last night, final negotiations between both chambers and both parties in Washington are getting underway with heightened intensity.

We have asked for \$46.6 billion in federal funding for higher education. This does not cover the full need for higher education. In fact, starting earlier in the summer, we recognized that reopening was going to take significant effort. Using figures provided by NAICU members and in consultation with our peer higher education associations, we estimated the cost of safely reopening across higher education at \$73.8 billion.

While progress has been made on the funding levels and liability protections we are seeking, neither the Senate Republican proposal released last night nor the Democratic House bill passed in May provide enough support for colleges and universities and their students.




We recommend a funding level of *at least* \$46.6 billion for institutions and students to address increased student financial need and increased institutional costs and revenue losses.

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### **Endowments**

Funds should not be tied to an institution's endowment. Endowments are not a proxy for an institution's financial situation. The endowment formula specifically discriminates against private colleges and institutions that are smaller in size, while targeting many institutions on the forefront of our nation's response to the current pandemic.

### **Do Not Penalize Institutions Based on Endowments**


Senate GOP bill contains a provision that limits allocations to 50% for IHE's that are subject to the endowment tax and allows them to only use their funds for student grants.

## **Student Eligibility**

## **Liability Protection**

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# Senate GOP Liability Proposal

- Institutions shielded from liability unless plaintiff proves by clear and convincing evidence that the institution:
  - Was not making reasonable efforts to comply with applicable government standards; and
  - Engaged in gross negligence or willful misconduct.
- State laws would be preempted, unless they impose stricter liability limits.

- Lending, Including the Paycheck Protection Program
  - House extends to all non-profits
  - Senate GOP bill provides limited reboot, but only for entities with severe revenue drop
- Employer tax credits for protective expenses to help protect workers
- Increased unemployment relief for employers who self-insure
