At a time of continued economic and financial uncertainty, particularly for those communities that have been disproportionality impacted by COVID-19, no investment will have a more far-reaching and meaningful return than additional funding for educational opportunities. Doubling the Pell Grant will increase college participation rates, improve graduation rates and allow more students to graduate with little to no student debt. An investment in the Pell Grant program is nothing less than an investment in our collective future.

We encourage you to support President Biden's efforts to ensure that the federal investment in college affordability truly makes higher education a reality for Massachusetts' low-income and first-generation college students and their families. We stand ready to assist you in this effort.
